Team Digital. Like all things, you adapt the knowledge for yourself.





For the September exhibition 'Photojournalism/Social Documentary', we were fortunate to have **Brent Acie** as the judge.

Brent has a rich and colourful background in Art and Design and is actively involved in consulting and training in the photographic industry. I believe Brent offered some very helpful and informative feedback. He presented us with an insightful look at what is considered when judging.

For Brent, the image effectively scores higher if it is expressing message and meaning to evoke emotion, convey a statement or story or to transmit an idea. He informed us that he was going to consider how effective 'the decisive moment was pulled off in an image, where the viewer is cast in the scene and how well the action part of the photo was framed.

We had 3 members equally topping the scores this month. Jane, and Diederik Speijers, and Steve Cook. Although Jane's simply beautiful print, 'Shelter' was awarded a Merit by the judge, it certainly won the




PHOTOMARKET COMING UP! By Bob Halligan

The Library audit was completed on July 17. A number of books were found to be missing with no obvious explanation, while some had been borrowed for a lengthy period of time.

The library cards are in a small plastic box on the shelf to the right of the door as you enter. Please complete the relevant card if you borrow a book. If I am around please feel free and I will explain.


Jane Speijers and Phil Arntzen have scanned the ISBNs for the books which presently don't have their ISBNs listed in the catalogue, and they should appear soon.

A recent addition to the Library is *Mastering Bird Photography* by Marie Read.

Building on basic technical topics such as camera choice, lens choice, and camera settings, the book reveals how field craft, compositional decisions, and knowledge of bird behaviour contribute greatly to a successful bird photograph.

Over 400 images contained in the book provide details on equipment used, as well as camera settings.

I enjoyed the book so much that I purchased one for myself!





Easter in Ethiopia by Jane Speijers

While travel to other countries can be enjoyable for all sorts of reasons – scenery, food, history – there is no doubt that the photographic yield from some countries is much higher than others.

Ethiopia is one of those countries. After a 16 day trip there in April/May Diederik and I felt we had come home with some good images of the markets, people, cultural practices and animals we had seen on our travels.

Ethiopia is famous for its rock-hewn Christian churches from the 12th and 13th centuries which are still used as places of worship by the Coptic Christian majority.

We visited Lalibela, the site of these churches, at Easter when thousands of local people attend services dressed in white robes.

On Easter Friday there is a candlelit service which is very atmospheric and pho-



tographically challenging. There is only one way to manage shutter speed in very low light and that is high ISO. Our photos were noisy but still captured the drama of the scenes. We were amazed by the ancient religious treasures that were stored in old cupboards in many of the outlying monasteries we visited. There were rarely any other tourists to compete with, apart from our

own group of 12, and the priests were happy to show us their treasures.

Ethiopia is the second most populous country in Africa with an estimated population of about 110 million in a land area similar to South Australia.



It has deserts along the eastern border, tropical forests in the south and mountains in the northern and southwestern parts. <u>Lake Tana</u> in the north is the source of the <u>Blue Nile</u> which is one of a number of large rivers.

As you might expect markets are everywhere.



It was generally quite acceptable to photograph people and activities in the markets.

Sometimes people indicated they did not want their photo taken but on other occasions people asked us to take their photo.
