At our November meeting the committee decided to change the criteria for awarding Gold, Silver and Bronze awards next year to be consistent with the WAPJA awards system which allocates a level between 1 and 8 to images (see https://wapja.com.au/index.php/what-s-it-all-about/wapja-vs-wapf-awards-systems). Images scored levels 7/8 will be awarded a gold, level 6 a silver and level 5 a bronze. A new merit award will be introduced for images scored as level 4. The new system will be fully explained with examples at one of our first meetings in 2019. Almost all the judges we use for exhibitions are WAPJA accredited and trained using this system.

Our AGM will be postponed next year from mid-February until mid-March due to the absence of a number of key committee members in February. While we are expecting nominations for most of the senior positions we still need an Exhibition Director, an essential position for our exhibitions. Past Exhibition Directors, Gary Louth and Jill Luha will offer support. I would encourage members to think about nominating for the committee. It is a great way to engage with the club and get to know other members.

Thanks to all those members who supported the club by attending the Christmas Function.


Aerial Photography and Videography using Drones by Eric Cheng

Because camera-carrying drones still really only exist on the edge between hobby and the mainstream, there is still a lot of confusion about what these small drones are capable of doing.


This book will explain just what is possible with a range of readily available consumer and professional drones.



Travelling in the USA National Parks

What a great adventure we had!

Roman and I started in Alaska, travelled down to Canada via the usual cruise, then across the bottom of Canada until we reached the Glacier National Park, vertically down to Mexico before heading to Las Vegas and the Hawaiian islands. We were

away for 8 weeks.

In that trip we crossed at least 14 National Parks (there are 60) and several State parks.

If you know the system, you can benefit

greatly by buying the special National Parks Pass, called America the Beautiful Pass. Many parks have entrance



fees of up to \$25, so purchasing an annual park pass for US\$80 makes sense.

Buy it anytime, and it is valid per vehicle for entrance to all National Parks and national wildlife refuges, day-

use fees at national forests and grasslands and at lands managed by the Bureau of Land Management, Bureau of Reclamation, and US Army Corps of Engineers. But not at State parks.

In general, one pass covers the fees for a driver and all passengers in a personal vehicle at per-vehicle fee areas or up to four adults at sites that charge per person. Children age 15



or under are admitted free.

Where did we go?

Denali Park in Alaska for starters, though Alaska has at least 6 National Parks. Great for seeing Mt Denali (Mt

McKinlay), grizzlies and antelope of various kinds. The cruise provided stops at various destinations where grizzlies could be viewed safely and quite close.



Grizzlies, brown bears and various antelope could be seen practically in all National Parks, though luck plays a huge part.

In Washington State we travelled through only one park

(North Cascades), which is quite spectacular, before heading for our main destination in Montana (Glacier) - fabulous! Through Wyoming, Utah and Arizona, we saw the mountainous (Grand Tetons), the volcanic (Yellowstone), the Canyonlands (Capitol Reef, Canyonlands, Arches, Grand Canyon), the slot canyons (Antelope), and the dry parks (Mojave, Saguaro and Organ Pipe Cactus). And Hawaii, well known for its volcanic parks. No, we didn't go to Bryce, Zion etc - can't do them all!



Each day was a revelation - outdoing one another in spectacular visions and beauty. Which was the best? No idea - each one held its own beauty and uniqueness.

Is it safe? Sure. The people are very friendly, the roads are good and the drivers are better than ours.

Would I go again? Sure, this was my third visit. I have yet to see Niagara Falls!
